Conversation Cafe

Friday Oct 17, 2025. 1pm- 4pm. Main hall.

The Conversation Cafe is an opportunity to synthesize the learning from the conference and draw on the wisdom of everyone present. Small groups will discuss the nuggets collected throughout the conference and identify key priorities and recommendations for actions that will influence the future of range and grassland health in the future.

The recommendations document (collated and edited afterwards) is intended to capture our collective knowledge and provide a blueprint for the future. It will be a tangible take-away from the conference that can be used by all participants to help inform their work on improving range and grassland health in the East Kootenays. - What is the future of abundant wild food and medicine in Grasslands & Rangelands?
- What is the future of sustainable ranching and agriculture in Grasslands & Rangelands?
- What is the future of healthy ungulate populations in Grasslands & Rangelands?
- What is the future of responsible recreation in Grasslands & Rangelands?
- What is the future of healthy Grasslands & Rangelands in a changing climate?

Field Tours

Saturday Oct 18, 2025. 8:30am - 2:30pm

Departing from the Kimberley Conference Centre main parking lot at 8:30am via carpool. Field tours will involve some light hiking (about 4km return with 130m elevation gain at the first location, light walking at the second location). We'll be outside for the whole time in whatever weather nature gifts us. Please come prepared with sturdy footwear, warm and dry clothing, water and food. (Note on lunches: some participants have ordered bagged lunches, we'll distribute those in the morning.) You may want to bring binoculars.

We will carpool to the field sites. For people in the Kimberley area, meet at the Kimberley Conference centre at 8:30am. For folks from the Cranbrook area, meet at the Tamarack Mall, parking lot in front of Staples.

FIRST STOP

Wycliffe Conservation Complex: Improved grassland health combining restoration, protection, and stewardship through a unique partnership approach

Field trip leaders:

Field Trip description:

This collaborative tour will take place at several points of interest within the Wycliffe Conservation Complex – a complex of more than 1450 hectares (3500+ acres) of conservation lands managed by a partnership between the Province (MWLRS), The Nature Trust of BC, and the Nature Conservancy of Canada. This ecologically diverse area contains native grasslands, mixed forest, wetlands, riparian habitats, and small lakes. The Complex contains Class 1 Ungulate Winter Range, is home to several Species at Risk, and is part of a critical cross-valley wildlife movement corridor connecting the Rocky Mountains to the Purcell Mountains. The field tour will showcase how the partnership is working together to improve grassland health in this important area through securement and stewardship efforts and various ecological restoration and enhancement projects.

SECOND STOP

New and exciting tools combined to improve grassland health and benefits to communities

Field Trip description:

This collaborative tour will take us to the Thibeault ranch which abuts two other parcels of public and private land. The tour will showcase many tools and possible solutions discussed during the conference involving high-tech tools, novel program approaches, and sustainable funding. Highlights will include targeted grazing with the use of virtual fencing, payment for ecosystem services, and ecosystem restoration and monitoring using drones, and conservation dogs.


