

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



Free public talks

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We entered into our third season CREDtalks (Columbia Region Ecological Discussions) where we hosted five great speakers addressing a wide variety of topics. We also hosted a well attended talk by Eva Schindler, BC MFLNRORD, on hydroelectric impacts and compensation/restoration strategies used in the Columbia Region. While an effort was made to record and post these talks, we experienced significant problems with our recording equipment and as a result only one talk was recorded and posted (we promise to do better next season!) We thank the speakers for volunteering their time and sharing their knowledge with us.


Conferences & workshops

We held a brand new (to us) workshop addressing Critical Habitat Screening and the first one in the spring was so popular that we held another one in the fall (see here and here. In the spring we also held our conference on Regulated Rivers II: Science. Restoration, and Management of Altered Riverine Environments. This event brought 115 people together for a keynote address with Eva Schindler, 2 days of presentations, a poster session, and networking opportunities. This event provided an opportunity for scientists and managers to share results of recent research on regulated river environments, processes, and operations in the Pacific Northwest and elsewhere. These events tend to be small but are always high value as locals come together to provide updates on their new initiatives, research projects and the like. 
